

General Information

Medical Information

All medicines including inhalers should be taken to the School Office by you/an adult, and not be given directly to the child. Paperwork needs to be completed by parents for any medication including inhalers to be administered in school. (The Office staff will pass inhalers to the class teachers which will be kept in the classroom). Please inform the office if any details change including phone numbers and addresses throughout the year.

Uniform

We expect all children to wear school uniform. Jewellery including earrings should not be worn apart from a wrist watch.

Long hair must be tied up with a plain bobble/hair ties/slides in school colours purple, black, white or grey. Large bows will be discouraged.

PE kit should be in school every day.

Please ensure all items of uniform are labelled including coats, shoes and PE Pumps, book bags etc.

A Lost Property Box is in the school entrance.

Healthy Snack

Water Bottles:-

Please make sure that your child has a labelled water bottle. This can be filled up in school during the day. **No juice.** We encourage your child to bring home their water bottles each night so they can be washed.

Snack

F2/KS1: The infant children are provided with a piece of fruit for a mid morning snack. **KS2**:-The KS2 children also run a tuck shop three times a week (Monday, Wednesday and Friday) selling healthy snacks to the junior children. All items are priced at 50p.

All children can bring in a snack from home if they wish to using our updated list of acceptable snacks:-

-portion of fruit or vegetables e.g. carrot sticks, a small pot of low fat dip e.g. humus, 1 large rice cakes or 2-3 small plain rice cake, 2 oatcakes, 2 -3 bread sticks, Raisins, half a fruit or plain scone, 1-2 small slices of malt loaf or Bara Brith with low fat spread. (homemade is best as you can control amount of salt, sugar and fat)

We do not allow crisp, sweets and fizzy drinks as we are encouraging healthy eating within school.

Milk

Milk is available to purchase for children and must be ordered on-line with the milk company - <u>https://www.schoolmilkuk.com</u> Details are available from the school office or via the school website.

Behaviour

We promote a positive behaviour system that reinforces and rewards good behaviour. Our school charter has been agreed by staff, children and Governors to ensure a positive learning environment. The children are taught about their rights and their responsibilities to ensure the school rules are being promoted and followed.

All children are placed into one of four houses when they join school. They may not always be in the same house as their siblings and from time to time we have to reorganize the house allocations to ensure we have even numbers in each class for sports day team events.

Children earn house points throughout the week and they are then collated and announced in our Friday's Celebration Assembly. The winning house receives a trophy for the display. The house with the most trophies at the end of the half term are rewarded with a non-uniform day.

Purple Passes — Each class can earn purple passes each week.

These are awarded for whole class behaviour. Classes achieving 20 or more at the end of the week will be congratulated in Friday's Celebration Assembly and be awarded an extra15 min playtime the following week.

Cup of Kindness – This is presented in our Friday Celebration Assembly to any child who has demonstrated a particular act of kindness nominated by staff and children.

Twitter, photographs and Week ahead Email

We like to keep you informed and share the children's learning with you via our school **Twitter** page. A letter has been emailed out asking you to say whether you consent or not to the use of photos in school.

Staff will send a '**week ahead**' email on a Friday to remind you of any significant events that week or activities that your child's class will be involved in.

E-Safety

We use lots of different kinds of technology so there is a great importance in the teaching of e-safety within the school curriculum to support them both in school and at home. We cover cyber bullying and the effects it can have, social networking sites and their restrictions, gaming and how we can protect ourselves online. We also teach the children about respect and the negative impact social media can have on other people when comments are placed on social networking sites.

If you do have any concerns or questions about e-safety please talk to a member of staff. In school we have a very high level of filters so children are unable to access restricted websites that could be harmful to them.

The children don't need to bring into school toys from home. We will inform you if they are to bring something into school.

Reading

- We will be sending home a picture reading book on Friday 21st
 September 2018
- The children will bring home one new book on a Monday and another new book on a Thursday.
- Children need to have their reading books in school everyday so we can hear them read. They are encouraged to put their reading book bag in the book box when they arrive in school. We would like to ask you to sign your child's reading record when they have read their book.

Reading Process:-

-Most children will start with a Picture book.

-Move onto Words – children will bring home key words to learn. We will check regularly to see if they have learnt to read them.

-Move onto reading Sentences.

=Every child is an individual and will all progress at different times.

=Please note: Reading books are in colour bands starting at pink not levels. The numbers on the back have no reference to where your child is in terms of their reading.

READING IS AN IMPORTANT SKILL AND WE ENCOURAGE CHILDREN TO READ REGULARY AT HOME AND TO READ A VARIETY OF BOOKS FOR ENJOYMENT.

Phonics

- The children will be taught phonics everyday which follows them into KS1. Phonics is an important part of the reading process.
- What is Phonics?
- Children are taught to read by breaking down words into separate sounds or 'phonemes'. They are then taught how to blend these sounds together to read the whole word.
- Some helpful lingo: Phoneme-sounds (hear), grapheme letters that make the phoneme/sound (see), digraphs, trigraphs, CVC, CV, VC, tricky words, blending and segmenting.
- We will send home work to support the sounds the children will learn over the week.

Home Learning

Maths and English homework will be sent home on a **Thursday** and should be returned before the following **Wednesday**.

Learning Letters for each year group will be on the website each half term – these have extra challenges for you to do at home with your child.

Foundation Stage:-

Reading – All children will be given two reading books to read at home each week. Key words will be sent home as appropriate. Plus Phonic activities linked to the sounds learnt over the week.

After October half term the children will take home either a Literacy or Maths homework alternate each week.

Literacy - The children will have phonics homework linked to the sounds they have been learning that week and practise handwriting and application of phonics into writing.

Maths – The children will have Maths homework to practise the skills they have been learning in school.

If you have any questions or concerns regarding your child's education please ring the office to either get clarification or make an appointment with the class teacher.
