


Read, Write, Inc.



This year we are introducing 'Read, Write Inc.', a literacy programme by Ruth Miskin.

The whole programme covers phonics, reading, writing and spelling and will be used in F2 and Y1.



Why Read Write Inc.



The programme is systematic and structured, meaning that the demands of the EYFS Curriculum and The National Curriculum are met.

It also prepares them ready for the National Phonics Screening Check that takes place when the children are in Year 1 in June. Why



Phonics?

Once your child is secure with the set 1 sounds and are able to blend orally with confidence, they will start to bring home a Red Ditty book. This book has 3 ditties. They read a ditty a day and then re read at home. They will then start a new book on day 4.

They will also receive an additional book from our school reading scheme. These book bands are aligned to the RWI scheme, ensuring that the children are consolidating the phonics they have learnt and applying these skills in context.

A bit of technical vocabulary...

Phoneme - spoken sounds - there are about 44 in the English language

Grapheme - how we write each of the spoken sounds e.g the spoken sounds 'f' is written using the graphemes f, ff, ph.

Red words - words that cannot be sounded out e.g. I, said, they

Green words - words that can be sounded out using our phonics

What is phonics?

Every word is made up of sounds.

- How many sounds are in the word cat?
- How many sounds are in the word ship?
- How many sounds are in the word light?

C-a-t

 3 sounds each represented by a single letter.

Sh-i-p

 3 sounds. Sh is one sound represented by two letters (digraph)

L-igh-t

 - 3 sounds. Igh is one sound represented by three letters (trigraph)

- Do you know how many sounds are in the English language?
- Do you know how many graphemes we use for these sounds?



How do phonics help us read?

Say "hello" to Fred.

Fred can only talk in sounds...


He says "m_a_t." Not **mat**.



We call this Fred Talk. The children sometimes read the word using 'Fred in your head'

Fred Talk

We use Fred fingers to help us spell within phonics lessons and across the wider curriculum.



'Read, Write Inc.' Phonics and Storybooks work together

Speed Sounds/ Word Time	Ditties	Green books/ Purple Books	Pink Books	Orange books	Yellow books	Blue Books	Grey Books	Off of the programme
Teach speed sounds set 1 (1 a day). Teach WT 1-3.	Review speed sounds 1 and focus on digraphs, sh, th, ch, qu, ng, nk.	Review set 1 sounds and word times. Teach set 2 sounds.	Review set 2 sounds.  We read each phonics book three times. The first read is for accuracy, the second is for fluency and the third is for comprehension. The teacher also reads the story to the children to model using expression.

• The children read the red words, story words and speedy green words with their partners and as a group to build fluency.

- Throughout the three days the children also complete spelling, grammar, punctuation and handwriting activities.
- We practise building sentences using key words from the story using Hold a Sentence

e.g. A cat in a hat MTYT

• This is an opportunity to apply the skills they have learned.

How to help your child at home...



You can read stories with your child. Relentlessly.

Read favourite stories over and over again

Read some stories at a higher level than they can read themselves.

Listen to them reading their RWI books. These books are designed to ensure that the children feel successful and confident when reading to motivate them to read for pleasure.

IT ADDS UP!

If you read just 15 minutes a day, in one year you will have read over 1,000,000 words!

Read With a Child It's the Most Important 20 Minutes of Your Day

Child "A" reads <u>20 minutes</u> each day 3,600 minutes in a school year. Child "B" reads <u>5 minutes</u> each day 900 minutes in a school year. Child "C" reads 1 minute each day 180 minutes in a school year.



Reading for pleasure

If you read just one book a day to your child, they will have been read 1825 books by their 5th birthday.

> Every Day Counts. Every Book Counts.

Talking

- Talk to your child as much as possible and 'feed' them new and ambitious vocabulary
- "Let's eat our lunch now."
- "Let's munch our lunch now."
- "Let's scoff our lunch now."
- "Let's devour our lunch now."

Please remember:

When reading with your child at home, it is meant to be easy! They are consolidating what they have learnt at school, not learning anything new. If they find it too difficult they will not enjoy reading at home. Reading is a pleasurable activity.
