

After this time all children should enter via the Main Entrance and report to School Office.

3:30 - End of school day.

All absences must be reported to school office. If children are being picked up by someone else then please inform staff on the school gate or contact the school office.



Routine Changes

- Children will leave school out of the Year 3/4 door.
- Playtimes will change to 10:30 and will be with Year 4
- We will begin to encourage your child to take a more independent approach to their work, including the changing of reading books and organisation of items.



Leaving school

We understand that some parents may wish to give their children permission to walk across to the infant building to meet their designated adult at the end of the day and perhaps for some of the older pupils to walk home independently.

A letter has been sent home to clarify the end of day arrangements for your child/ren. Please confirm the collection arrangements for your child September to avoid any confusion.

General Information

Medical Information

All medicines including inhalers should be taken to the School Office by you/an adult, and not be given directly to the child. Paperwork needs to be completed by parents for any medication including inhalers to be administered in school. (The Office staff will pass inhalers to the class teachers which will be kept in the classroom). Please inform the office if any details change including phone numbers and addresses throughout the year.

Uniform

We expect all children to wear school uniform. Jewellery including earrings must not be worn apart from a wrist watch. Black school shoes must be worn and **not** trainers.

Long hair must be tied up with a plain bobble/hair ties/slides in school colours purple, black, white or grey. Large bows will be discouraged.

PE kit should be in school every day.

Please ensure all items of uniform are labelled including coats, shoes and PE pumps, book bags etc.

A Lost Property Box is in the school entrance.

Healthy Snack

Water Bottles:-

Please make sure that your child has a labelled water bottle. This can be filled up in school during the day. **No juice.** We encourage your child to bring home their water bottles each night so they can be washed.

Snacks

KS2: All children can bring in a snack from home if they wish to using our updated list of acceptable snacks such as carrot sticks or raisins.

We do not allow sweets and fizzy drinks as we are encouraging healthy eating within school. As we have several children with nut allergies in school, we do not allow nutbased snacks. This includes peanut butter.

Milk

Milk is available to purchase for children and must be ordered on-line with the milk company - https://www.schoolmilkuk.com Details are available from the school office or via the school website.

Behaviour

We promote a positive behaviour system that reinforces and rewards good behaviour. Our school charter has been agreed by staff, children and Governors to ensure a positive learning environment. The children are taught about their rights and their responsibilities to ensure the school rules are being promoted and followed.

All children are placed into one of four houses when they join school. They may not always be in the same house as their siblings and from time to time we have to reorganize the house allocations to ensure we have even numbers in each class for sports day team events.

Children earn house points throughout the week and they are then collated and announced in our Friday's Celebration Assembly. The winning house receives a trophy for the display. The house with the most trophies at the end of the half term are rewarded with a non-uniform day.

Purple Passes — Each class can earn purple passes each week.

These are awarded for whole class behaviour. Classes achieving 20 or more at the end of the week will be congratulated in Friday's Celebration Assembly and be awarded an extra15 min playtime the following week.

Purple Certificates — Class teachers award certificates in Friday's

Cup of Kindness — This is presented in our Friday Celebration

Assembly to any child who has demonstrated a particular act of kindness nominated by staff and children.

Twitter, photographs and Week ahead Email

We like to keep you informed and share the children's learning with you via our school **Twitter** page. A letter has been emailed out asking you to say whether you consent or not to the use of photos in school.

Staff will send a 'week ahead' email on a Friday to remind you of any significant events that week or activities that your child's class will be involved in.

E-Safety

We use lots of different kinds of technology so there is a great importance in the teaching of e-safety within the school curriculum to support them both in school and at home. We cover cyber bullying and the effects it can have, social networking sites and their restrictions, gaming and how we can protect ourselves online. We also teach the children about respect and the negative impact social media can have on other people when comments are placed on social networking sites.

If you do have any concerns or questions about e-safety please talk to a member of staff. In school we have a very high level of filters so children are unable to access restricted websites that could be harmful to them.

RRS and Philosophy

Rights Respecting School (RRS)

As a Right Respecting School children will be encouraged to think about their rights and responsibilities. We promote and respect the rights of the child which is outlined in the United Nations Convention of the rights of the child. We have recently completed Gold level (the highest level) and now will work to maintain this

achievement.





Philosophy for children (P4C)

We teach philosophy to help the children develop their thinking, reasoning and questioning skills. It helps them develop their skills to be able to say:- What they think? What other ideas are there? What do others feel? What do others think?



'Growth Mindset'

Your mindset is a mental attitude that determines how you will interpret and respond to situations. It's a set of beliefs or a way of thinking that determines certain behaviours such as how you think, what you feel, and what you do.

There are two types of mindset 'Fixed' and 'Growth'.





Fixed Mindset:- Intelligence is fixed, avoid or fear challenges, give up when things are tough, make excuses, don't try so you won't fail, refuse to learn from mistakes.

Growth Mindset:- Intelligence can be developed, embrace challenge without fear, keep trying in the tough times, remember success takes work, learn from mistakes, listen to feedback and learn from mistakes.

At Poulton Lancelyn we are developing our teaching and learning around growth mindsets to promote:-

- a love for learning and self-improvement
 - a desire to be challenged
- a willingness to work for positive results
- a belief that you can control the outcomes in your life with effort and practice
 - the ability to learn from mistakes and failures
 - emotional resilience

Educational Visits and Visitors

We try to organise school trips and invite visitors to school to enhance the teaching of the curriculum and inspire children's learning. The school may request voluntary contributions towards the cost of such activities. We will be aiming to visit a recycling centre as part of our environment topic.

Home Learning

Maths and English homework will be sent home on a Thursday and should be returned before the following Wednesday.

Reading

Reading will be taught daily. All children will be given a reading book to read at home that week and encourage to change their book independently when complete. Non-fluent readers will read to an adult daily in school and should read daily at home. Each child will be given a reading record to evidence the books they have read. We encourage you to read further books together as a family as much as possible to develop a love of reading.

Spelling

Children will be taught spelling patterns, age appropriate common exception words and topic related vocabulary in school. Each half term, weekly spelling lists will be uploaded to Year Group pages on the Website. These spellings are to practise at home to consolidate the spellings learnt in school each week.

Maths

We will continue to develop skills across all aspects of mathematics, including counting and understanding number, knowing and using number facts, calculating, understanding shape, measuring and handling data. Children will be sent homework related to the work the children have been completing in school, often using My Maths.

Communication

If you have **any** questions or concerns regarding your child's education please ring the office to either get clarification or make an appointment with the class teacher. All information regarding upcoming school events can be found on the calendar on the school website.
